



World War II

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Course Description

This course aims to add more context and nuance into the traditional American views of the Second World War. Although keeping the American experience at the center, it examines that experience through a global lens. The content covered will challenge some of the myths and half-truths that Hollywood has bequeathed to Americans about the war while introducing some arguments that have emerged from the latest scholarship on themes like the home front, the actual fighting of the war, and the processes of peacemaking. The intention of this course is to provide a serious, scholarly, and objective analysis of the interplay between American, world, and military history during the most destructive war ever.
