

Foundations of American Government

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Course Description

This course examines the "why" and the "how" of American government through in-depth discussion of its history and workings. Professor Denver Brunsman begins with the early trial and error of American government, detailing the ideals set forth in the Declaration of Independence, the flawed initial attempt at governance in the Articles of Confederation, and the debates over the US Constitution. It continues with a practical examination of the three branches of government, focusing not only on the work that each branch does but the interaction between the branches. Finally, the course focuses on linkage institutions, including interest groups, political parties, and the media, that connect Americans with their government and influence their votes.

Lecture Videos

This course consists of approximately 12 hours of instruction presented by Professor Denver Brunsman, split into 24 lecture videos ranging from 20 to 25 minutes long. The videos provide the content needed to answer the course quizzes.
