





#### "OLD VETO!"

#### ANYTHING GOOD ENOUGH FOR THE POOR!

It is a matter of common repute that the poor are the worst victims of those that adulterate food. The wealthy can afford to pay a price for domestic commodities that will more than protect them from poisonous and innutritious food products. The poor man who buys where he can buy the cheapest is the readiest victim of the dealer who adulterates lard with tallow, sugar and syrups with glucose, pepper with buckwheat, flour with plaster-of-Paris, and so on. Largely in the interests of the working classes a bill was passed in 1884, during the last session of the Legislature "Amending the act to prevent adulteration of food and drugs." Governor Cleveland would not sign it and gave as a reason that it was imperfect in construction and did "not seem to be just right in substance." So the dealer who wishes to swindle the poor man in his purchases of food, can go on with his false pretences and worse than thievery. Governor Cleveland would not stophim, nor would be permit the Legislature to stop him.





## SCIENTIFIC TEMPERANCE INSTRUCTION IN SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES.

From November, 1886, to November, 1887.

MRS. MARY H. HUNT, Superintendent.

The cause of Temperance will ever be a fluctuating reform until it is based on the education of the people as to the proven facts and deductions of science, namely: That the nature and effects of alcoholic drinks and other narcotics are poisonous to the human system, and as such should be abolished from personal habits and lawful traffic.

Therefore, early education through the schools of every child in the Republic as to the real nature and effects of alcoholic drinks and other narcotics is the object of this Department, which was created in 1880, with its aims then only untried ideas.

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
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


