



# History of Latina and Latino People in the United States

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### **Course Description**

The recent growth of the Latino population has transformed the United States. It has heightened debates about Latinas' and Latinos' political power, cultural influence, citizenship, civil rights, and ethnic and racial categorization. This increased attention may feel new, but Latino communities have played a pivotal role in US history for a long time. In this course, students will explore the history of Latinas and Latinos in the United States—and across the Americas—from the sixteenth century through the early twenty-first century, covering themes such as race, migration, labor, and empire.

It is the history of a community, or, rather, several communities, including Mexican Americans, Puerto Ricans, Dominican Americans, Central Americans, and Cuban Americans. The members of these communities have moved within and between the US, Latin America, and the Caribbean, where they've struggled almost continuously for equality and belonging. Ultimately, students will gain a deeper sense of the issues and histories that bring Latinas and Latinos together and those that continue to divide them.

### **Lecture Videos**

This course consists of approximately 12 hours of instruction presented by Professor Cadava, split into 29 lecture videos ranging from 11 to 30 minutes.
